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Critical Deadlines for Funding and Grants

COVID – and to help the authorizers with their own oversight.

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CCAP Co-founds National Network of State Initiatives to Strenghten Local Authorizing

A new organization, the <u>National Network for District Authorizing</u> (NN4DA), has been launched by the California Charter Authorizing Professionals (CCAP), the <u>Colorado Association of Charter School Authorizers</u> (CACSA), and the <u>Florida Association of Charter School Authorizers</u> (FACSA) to support state-level initiatives in strengthening charter authorizing practices of local school districts.

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Implementing the new community interest policy in authorizing decisions

Assembly Bill 1505 added a new community interest requirement to charter school petitions. CCAP and WestEd have been working with a group of authorizers to create a supplement to our toolkits containing guidelines for authorizers on how to evaluate petitions and work with charter schools and community

leaders to ensure that community needs will be met.
